Chair & CEO Report

In another year marked by uncertainty and continued financial pressures on families, Children in Northern Ireland (CiNI) and our members have remained steadfast in our mission; to place the needs, rights, and wellbeing of children, young people, and families at the heart of everything we do. Amid growing challenges across education, health, and social care, CiNI has continued to demonstrate leadership, collaboration, and innovation across all areas of our work.

We are proud to have achieved significant progress this year by:

- Strengthening Parentline NI, which supported over 7,000 parents and carers through calls, webchats, and workshops, helping families manage challenges around behaviour, school anxiety, and emotional wellbeing.
- Delivering high-quality Learning and Development programmes, training over 3,400 professionals across 212 events, with 97% rating our courses Good to Excellent.
- Launching new policy initiatives, including the Partnership for Inclusive Education and convening two Children's Policy Forums focused on Special Educational Needs reform and the Draft Programme for Government.
- ✓ Delivering impactful projects. 2024 saw the conclusion of a three-year grant from the National Lottery Community Fund for the Gets Active programme. During that time Get's Active supported over 10,000 children and 2,000 families to

- access healthy food and physical activities, and the launch of Be Cyber Safe NI, a youth-led online safety initiative in partnership with NSPCC.
- Establishing the Parents' Disability Forum, amplifying the voices of parents of children with disabilities and identifying key areas for policy reform and research.
- Coordinating Locality Planning Groups across the Southern area, strengthening collaboration among statutory, voluntary, and community partners to improve local services for children, young people and families.

These achievements reflect the commitment and passion of CiNI's staff, members, and partners, who continue to adapt and deliver for children and families across Northern Ireland.

We would like to extend our sincere thanks to our Board of Directors, staff, funders, and member organisations for their continued dedication and support. Together, we are building on a legacy of advocacy, learning, and collaboration that continues to strengthen our sector and improve the lives of children and families.

As we look ahead, we remain committed to ensuring that every child in Northern Ireland grows up safe, supported, and able to thrive, and that parents and carers receive the understanding, resources, and respect they deserve.

SAFEGUARDING IN THE DIGITAL WORLD

Policy: What We Do



Members

- » Convened the Children's Policy Forum in June 2024 and November 2024 to discuss Special Educational Needs Reform and the Draft Programme for Government.
- » Launched the Partnership for Inclusive Education in October 2024, a group of CiNI members focused on policy and advocacy in the area of Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND).
- » Supported NICCY's Equal Protection Working Group, including development of a Strategic Pathways roadmap to legislative reform.

Officials

- » Responded to the consultation on the Draft Programme for Government, emphasising the role that the sector plays in partnership with government and outlining an alternative programme of investment and reform that would benefit children, young people and families.
- » Engaged with officials from the Department of Education on public consultations relating to Free School Meal eligibility and School Attendance. Also attended the Department's stakeholder engagement forum as part of the development of a new Executive Early Learning and Childcare Strategy.
- » Submitted evidence on the Justice Bill, responded to the CYPSP's Children and Young People's Plan 2025-2028, and provided feedback on the implementation of the Children's Services Co-operation Act.

Public

- » Media coverage from BBC, Cool FM, and Belfast Telegraph as part of CiNI's campaign to restore Core Grant Funding for Voluntary and Community Sector organisations from the Department of Health.
- » Participated in a panel discussion at Parliament Buildings, organised by UNISON as part of their campaign for universal Free School Meals in Northern Ireland.
- » Published an article through Pivotal, the NI policy think tank, calling for a new Early Intervention Fund and linking this to tackling the challenges in children's social care.

Politicians

- » Met with the Minister of Health, Minister of Justice, Minister of Finance, and Minister of Education to raise key issues affecting children and families in NI, and the challenges facing the wider children's sector.
- » Hosted a General Election Hustings event in collaboration with Politics in Action, to support the Votes at 16 campaign, where young people questioned representatives from five parties on their key policies.
- » Issued Policy Briefing papers to MLAs on children's social care, core funding, and CiNI's role tackling child food insecurity through the Gets Active Project was acknowledged in an Assembly debate on 'holiday hunger.'

Projects: Our Impact

The Gets Active Project

Working closely with local delivery partners, including youth clubs and family centres across Northern Ireland, we continue to provide a range of food and activity programmes aimed at tackling disadvantage and food insecurity throughout school holiday periods. 2024 marked the end of a three-year grant from the National Lottery Community Fund, and during that time we recorded:



- » 10,604 attendances on our holiday programmes across Limavady, Carrickfergus and Downpatrick;
- » 2,166 engagements with parents, carers and family members as part of holiday activities;
- » 37,950 healthy and nutritious meals and snacks delivered during the holidays;
- » 3,546 food parcels distributed to families when children were not in school; and
- » 2,968 hours' worth of fun, physical activities including sports, games, and trips.

Our key food-related holiday activities included:

- Summer Scheme lunches, fresh fruit snacks during sports and activities;
- Information on healthy eating;
- Cookery classes, including slow cooker recipes, smoothie making etc.;
- Community 'banquets' and Family days/BBQs;
- Opportunities to grow food;
- Visits to food banks, community fridges and social supermarkets.

Our main fun and physical activities during holidays included:

- Couch to 5k, running, and mud runs;
- Basketball, volleyball, and football;
- Family walking challenge, fun fitness, and fitness for girls;
- Badminton, unihoc, and cricket;
- Boxercise and mixed martial arts;
- Footgolf and crazy golf;
- Bike rides, trips to parks, leisure centres, Splash NI, Escarmouche, the Coast, and Newcastle.

Some of the key skills and qualifications young people gained included:

- Mini chef course and Food Hygiene Certificate;
- Mini medic programme and First Aid Training;
- OCN NI Level 2
 Award in Youth
 Leadership; and
- OCN NI Level 3
 Certificate in Youth
 Work Practice.

The Gets Active Youth Advisory Group



Our regional Youth Advisory Group met monthly to shape the holiday programmes, discuss key challenges faced by young people, and develop tools to engage policymakers. In August 2024 they also hosted UK-wide youth participation conference in Glasgow, to share our work highlighting recommendations to tackle child food insecurity and learn lessons from other young people engaged in campaigns in Scotland, England and Wales.

In February 2025, the Youth Advisory Group met with Danny Baker MLA to discuss his proposal for a Private Members' Bill that would reinstate the School Holiday Food Grant for families in Northern Ireland.

Be Cyber Safe NI



On 30 January 2025, Children in Northern Ireland (CiNI) launched a new youth engagement and amplification project on online safety, in partnership with the NSPCC. The initiative links with NSPCC's Voice of Online Youth group and partner organisations in Wales and Scotland, creating UK-wide opportunities for young people's voices to shape the future of online safety.

CiNI has established a new youth advisory group – Be Cyber Safe NI (BCS NI) - in Northern Ireland, giving young people a platform to share their lived experiences, priorities, and concerns with key decision-makers. Through regular meetings, workshops and events, participants will help influence policy, practice, and solutions designed to protect children in the digital world.

The initiative is youth-led, with participants identifying topics, designing advocacy materials, and creating solutions. Early contributions from young people highlighted concerns about online dangers, privacy and personal data, and app controls.

When asked why they signed up, some of our young people responded:



"I wanted to try something new and get more experience. I want to make a

difference and have an impact [while] building my confidence and working with other young people from all around the UK."

"My opinion on online safety is that it's really safe, but [it's] not good that really

young children are using it."

Maria, 14, from Portadown



"I think there's too many dangers online."

Iona, 13 from Limavady



"There aren't enough safety precautions set up for young people online. I was invited by my leader to get involved in a positive

and relevant project, and I want to meet new people, boost [my] confidence, and have my voice heard."

Through extensive engagement with children and young people, the initiative will explore what online safety currently looks like for them, the effectiveness of controls and responses to harmful content/ behaviour, as well as other concerns such as Artificial Intelligence, online advertising, privacy and education. The project is also about influencing real change, and bridging the gap between young people and decision-makers, so it will aim to shift narratives, inform policies and improve the role that we all play in online safety.

Parents' Forum for Children with **Disabilities**

Over the past year, CiNI successfully established the Parents' Disability Forum, bringing together parents and carers of children with disabilities to share their lived experiences, identify gaps in support, and shape key recommendations for policymakers.

With the support of our Parent Advocate, Angie McCabe, the Forum has developed a clear advocacy plan, which we will take forward next year through the commissioning of new research. We would like to extend our sincere thanks to Angie for her commitment and






